Re: 2010 Annual Report

Mayor Fouts,

The responsibilities of the Fire Commissioner encompass providing an annual report to elected officials as mandated by the City Charter. I hereby submit the Fire Department Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 2010.

During 2010, the department responded to 13,460 alarms for the year. Of these responses, 10,084 were emergency medical incidents, which makes up 75% of all emergency incidents responded to by the department. Additionally, the department responded to three hundred and sixty-five (365) fire incidents of all types during 2010, with the remainder classified as general responses of all types totaling two thousand, nine hundred eighty-one (2,981). Total incident responses for all companies amounted to 24,010 alarms requiring emergency responses for fire apparatus of all types depending upon the type of incident reported. There were fourteen (14) serious civilian injuries and two (2) civilian deaths, as well as one (1)) significant injury to a firefighter resulting in lost work days for fire department employees. Also during the year there were nine (9) non-fire duty injuries to firefighters resulting in one hundred fifty-three (153) total days of work lost or three thousand seven hundred sixty-two (3,762) hours of lost man hours. Estimated fire losses for the year 2010 exceeded \$2.467 million dollars in real property losses and \$1.183 million in personal property losses during the year. There were fifty-six (56) fires where the estimated total loss was greater than \$25,0000.00, of which four (4) incidents exceeded an estimated \$100,000.00 or greater of real property loss. The most significant fire loss during 2010 occurred at 24657 Mound Road in a manufacturing facility, with the estimated real and personal property loss of \$110,000.00 and displacing the entire workforce for an extended period while repairs were made to the facility.

I would also like to take this opportunity to recognize the men and women of the Warren Fire Department for continuing to uphold the finest traditions of the fire service in a manner which instills trust by the citizens and business owners of our community and as employees of City of Warren. In addition, I would like to recognize the efforts of the Administrative personnel including the Fire Marshall and the Chiefs of Firefighting, Emergency Medical Services, Hazardous Materials, Apparatus and Training, in providing direction and supervision to the workforce. Additionally, I would also like to acknowledge the efforts of the secretarial staff, whom without their knowledge and dedication in performing the administrative functions necessary to administer a fire department, ensures that emergency response personnel are able to accomplish our mission of protecting the lives and property of the citizens, business owners and visitors to the great City of Warren, Michigan. I, as well as the entire department, look forward to 2011 and the challenges it will present given the economic challenges we are facing as a community, state and country. In closing, 2010 was a year of transition for the department with the reinstatement of medical transport services and continued turnover of senior employees due to retirements and separations. I am extremely confident that the entire workforce are up to the challenge of continuing to provide the high level of service demanded by the citizens of Warren in the most efficient and cost effective model possible.


Policy Statement



Statistical Trends of the Last Decade




ANALYSIS OF STATISTICS

In 2010 the Warren Fire Department had twelve apparatus that responded to emergencies within our city and to surrounding communities during times of major incidents. These apparatus are comprised of six engine companies, one ladder truck, one rescue and four squads. In addition our fleet contains three engines, two squads and one ladder truck in reserve to fill-in for our front line apparatus that are out of service for maintenance or repairs.

The following four pages contain the statistical information for the 2010 year. This information has been reported in several ways to provide a more complete and accurate accounting of incident response numbers and times. The Warren Fire Department responded to 13,440 incidents in 2010 which represents a 6.0% increase in run volume as compared to 2009. Since some incidents are more severe and require multiple companies, our total company responses for 2010 was 29,550, which represents a 68% increase when compared to the 18,381 responses in 2009. This dramatic increase in total apparatus responses is due to the return of EMS transport in January of 2010. Overall, our incident totals are up about 15% over the past 5 years, which represents an average increase in run volume of 3% per year. It is anticipated that incident responses will increase 3% to 5% again next year.







Chief of EMS

As Chief of EMS I am primarily responsible for all of the emergency medical training for the paramedics and EMTs of the Warren Fire Department. As such, I am required to maintain a Paramedic license and an Instructor Coordinator license issued by the Michigan Department of Community Health. I am also responsible for maintaining the license of the Warren Fire Department as an Advanced Life Support provider. I also maintain the WFD's certification by the State as an EMS Program Sponsor. This allows to be more flexible in our training dates which better suits our shift schedules.

EMS Training/Education

The Michigan Department of Community Health requires paramedics and EMTs to obtain a certain number of continuing education credits in various topics throughout their respective licensing periods. There were 3100 man hours of EMS training in 2010. Last year, 14 Paramedics and 14 Basic EMTs renewed their licenses through the continuing education classes held by the Warren Fire Department. All paramedics are ACLS certified (Advanced Cardiac Life Support) as mandated by Macomb County Medical Control Authority Protocols. All personnel renewed their BLS cards in 2010.

Personnel

There currently are 55 Paramedics assigned in the firefighting division below Battalion Chief. This number includes the 23 new employees hired with the implementation of transport. We have one Paramedic who is an FEO and out of the program. There are currently 52 Basic EMTs, one EMT-S, and one Medical First Responder. At this writing there are two openings and those hires that are expected in the next few weeks, as all future new hires, will be Paramedics.

EMS Transport

The Warren Fire Department returned to transport on January 25, 2010 with two paramedic squads. On March 4th a third squad was added, and on May 6th a fourth squad was placed in service. The third and fourth squad were made possible by the purchase in March of three used transport squads from Waterford.

Transport and billing has been a resounding success. Our residents are very happy with their Fire Department providing transport again. Through collections using a third party billing company, we've been able to generate revenue to cover costs and plan capital improvements for the future, something that hasn't been done in many years. We've been approved to purchase four new ambulances and should take delivery in June.

For the Future

The Warren Police Special Response Team has requested that the Warren Fire Department take over the Tactical EMS duties that were previously being performed by Universal Ambulance. Six of our paramedics have taken the required additional EMS classes (Pre-Hospital Trauma Life Support and Pediatric Advanced Life Support) and will attend the actual tactical training in February. Through grant funding we were able to order the necessary specialized ensembles to outfit them. They will be operational as when we take delivery of their gear.

The implementation of electronic submission of patient care reports and billing information to Accumed has been problematic. Beta testing is complete and electronic transfer should occur soon. Laptops will soon be ordered and once placed in service will aid our paramedics in the collection and reporting of patient data. The whole process will be streamlined and paper collection will be minimized.

Warren Fire Department Training Division 2010 Year End Review

This past year, the Training Division continued to expand our training as it became available and continued on with the core of our training curriculum which is made up of the following:

- Basic fire fighter skills such as ladder practices, hose operations, ventilation, knots and ropes, rescue, etc...
- Drivers obstacle course, Driver re-cert skills
- Pump practices and relay operations from engines to ladder trucks
- Standard Operating Guidelines
- Required hazardous materials training
- Fire Report as well as EMS reports and Billing
- Training with new techniques and equipment
- Safe practices for situations involving electric utilities
- Vehicle extrication
- Fire officer training
- Volt vehicle
- Mutual Aid response review

Administrative duties were extensive. Record keeping for 114 individuals is a time consuming, but a necessary task. Training was scheduled for three different Units and twenty seven different companies covering the entire year. Topics and content were developed and presented relative to the needs of the Department. Budget preparation and the management of existing monies were accomplished. Reviewing new equipment, technology, legislation, pending and adopted, as well as current events is a constant and never-ending responsibility.

Besides attending to the above, the Training Division other responsibilities seen to were attending the Macomb County Chiefs meetings, acting as liaison to Dispatch, networking with the other Fire Divisions, and interaction with various City Departments.

Looking ahead, the Training Division welcomes the task of preparing the Warren Fire Department's personnel to serve and protect our citizens in the up coming year. It is most often the journey and not the destination where mankind finds the most rewarding experiences.

Fire Prevention Division

In 2010, the Fire Prevention Division continued to perform the 3 main duties of Fire Prevention; education, prevention and fire investigation.

In cooperation with the Firefighting Division, we continued to educate the public in the area of fire prevention, both in schools and in other community arenas.

We performed annual inspections, certificate of occupancy inspections and final inspections for compliance with the adopted fire code. We performed acceptance tests on fire suppression and alarm systems. We reviewed site plans, building plans, alarm system plans and fire suppression system plans for fire code compliance. We investigated citizen complaints. We provided Phase One Environmental Review and Community Development Block Grant reports when requested.

We continued to investigate fires for the purpose of origin and cause determination. Together with the Warren Police Department, we investigated arson fires and assisted them in the prosecution and conviction of the perpetrators. We also investigated accidental fires to ascertain if specific household or commercial appliances and devices create an inherent risk of starting fires. We continued our Juvenile Fire Setter Intervention Program to educate children on the dangers of setting fires and to screen juveniles for potentially dangerous fire setting behaviors.





APPARATUS DIVISION

2010 was a year of change at the Apparatus Division. The Fire Department began a concentrated effort to begin using our City DPW for many of our repairs & maintenance. The City and all it's departments have to be cognizant of the economic reality that all municipalities face, shrinking resources. To that effect, using the City DPW for various Fire Department apparatus repairs & maintenance has proved to be a money saver.


In 2009, total Apparatus expenditures was \$303,649.26. For 2010, the total spent was \$211,939.24 This represents a reduction of approximately 30% for the year. 30% is a significant savings considering it's our first year of cooperation. As we learn to work together the end result should be money saved for the Fire Department and the City.

Of the \$211,939.24 spent in 2010, the majority went toward repairs & maintenance on our heavy fleet. Our fleet is comprised of 9 pumpers, 6 squads, 2 aerials and one rescue. Total spent on these 18 apparatus came to \$174,741.69 That figure represents approximately 70% of the total for the year.


The total expenditures as described above comes to \$193,349.76 The remaining balance of \$18,589.48 went toward maintenance and repairs on our 23 light duty trucks & cars. Also in that figure is included new equipment & supplies purchases for the year.

Looking at our fleet of 18 heavies and 23 light vehicles, it would require a 9 million dollar expenditure to replace them. Currently we are spending approximately 2.3% a year of that to keep our fleet operational.

Hazardous Materials Division 2010 Annual Report

In 2010 the Warren Fire Department responded to 110 incidents identified as involving some type of hazardous substance release. This number is similar to the 2009 response of 112 incidents.

Hazardous Materials Training

During 2010 the Hazardous Materials Team received 172 man hours of training in 9 training sessions. The average attendance at monthly training was 12 personnel which represents 50% of members currently assigned to the team. Hazardous Materials Team training sessions provided an average annual training of 6 hours 50 minutes per member. A highlight of the team's monthly trainings was a full scale exercise called Vigilant Guard, hosted by the US Army Garrison, Detroit Arsenal. The exercise spanned four days, June 14-17, 2010, culminating in a suspicious backpack with a white powder substance on June 17th, which the department's HazMat Team participated in.

In April 2010, the department hosted an 80 hour Hazardous Materials Technician course. With the completion of the class, the department was able to add 7 new members to the Hazardous Materials Team, increasing the team to 25 members.

Macomb County Hazardous Materials Response Team

In 2010 the three Regional Response Teams in Macomb County, Warren, Sterling Heights and Clinton Township, met several times over the course of the year to formalize the Inter-local agreement for the creation of a Macomb County Hazardous Materials Response Team. During the discussions, Shelby Township Fire Department was added as one of the Sponsoring Agencies. This agreement should be completed in 2011.

New Equipment Acquisitions

During 2010 the Warren Fire Department was able to secure some additional equipment by way of Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) Grant and the Metropolitan Medical Response System (MMRS) Grant. Total new equipment purchased in 2010 is valued at \$118,504 and has added new capabilities to our department.

November, 2010- The department received 6 new ONESuit, Level A entry suits with flash protection. The acquisition of these suits gives the HazMat Team an added level of fire protection and a 15 year warranty. The value of this purchase was \$13,155.





December, 2010 - The department received assorted collapse rescue tools, search cameras, and machine rescue equipment. With the purchase of this equipment, the department's Technical Rescue Team now has expanded capability in dealing with building collapse, trench rescue, confined space, high angle rescues and machine rescues. The value of this purchase was \$99,368. 0
