HOW THE 2020 U.S. CENSUS WILL INVITE WARREN RESIDENTS TO RESPOND

Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone. Nearly every household will recieve an invitation to participate in the census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

CENSUS SAFETY AND SECURITY

No matter how you respond, your information remains protected. The Census Bureau designed the information collection process with layers of security to keep your information safe.

Whether you respond online, by phone, by mail, or if a census employee comes to your door, your information is collected, transmitted and kept secure throughout the process. When you are on the secure website, you can verify it's safe by making sure the address begins with 'HTTPS' and includes a lock symbol.


If you're visited by a census employee, know that the technology they use has the same strong security controls, and is fully compliant with the standards mandated for Federal systems.

History of V-E Day

Victory in Europe, or V-E Day is the day celebrating the formal acceptance by the Allied nations of Nazi Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces. German military leaders signed the surrender documents at various locations in Europe on May 7. The surrender prompted mass celebrations in European and American cities. President Harry S. Truman dedicated V-E Day to President Roosevelt, who had died just weeks earlier, and is quoted with saying "Our victory is only half over," in reference to continued fighting in the Pacific Theatre.

No refunds after the second class. Refunds will only be processed by the Aquatic Supervisor or Swim Lesson Coordinator.



PRE-SCHOOL PROGRAM AGES 4 AND UP

Parent-Infant: With the parent's assistance, infants will learn water adjustment and basic water skills. Skills will be introduced through games, songs, and activities. Swim diaper and plastic pants required. For ages 2 and under.

Parent-Tot: With the parent's assistance, toddlers will focus on water exploration, floating, basic locomotion, stroke readiness and stroke development. Skills will be introduced through games, songs, and activities. Swim diaper and plastic pants required for those under. For ages 2 to 4.

Preschool 1: For children who are in class for the first time without a parent. Focuses on enjoyment in and on water adjustment (students do not go underwater). Students are supported by a teacher for all skills. For ages 3-4.

Preschool 2: For children who are not afraid of the water. This class will build upon basic swimming skills so children can gain more confidence in the water. Students begin to go underwater and float, glide, kick, and swim with little to no assistance in this class. For ages 3-4. Preschool 3: Students will float, glide, kick and swim with no assistance. Students will perform skills for longer durations/greater distances. Must be able to go underwater and swim on the front and back unassisted before enrolling. For ages 3-4.

LEVEL PROGRAMS-AGES 5 AND UP

Level 1: Students will work on increasing comfort in the water. Class objectives include full underwater bobs along and floating in the front and back with little to no assistance. For ages 5-10.

Level 2: For those who are ready to learn the foundations of front and back swimming. Students must be able to float with little or no assistance before enrolling. Previous swim lesson experience highly recommended. Ages 5-10.

Level 3: Students will learn correct technique for front crawl/elementary backstroke and will be introduced to dolphin kick, scissors kick and treading water. Must pass Level 2 or be able to swim 10 yards unassisted on the front and back before enrolling. Ages 5-12. Level 4: Students will increase endurance for front crawl/elementary backstroke. Participants will learn the backcrawl, sidestroke, breaststroke and butterfly. Class is held in deep water; must pass Level 3 before enrolling. Ages 6-14.

Level 5: Students will work on coordination and refinement of strokes to increase endurance and efficiency while swimming. Flip turns will be introduced. Students must know all six strokes before enrolling. Ages 7-14.

Level 6: Students will continue with refinement of strokes in order to swim with more ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances. Fitness elements will be taught to students. Must be proficient in all six strokes before enrolling. Ages 8-14.

TEEN PROGRAM-AGES 10-15

Beginner Teen: This class is for students that have minimal swimming experience. Students will learn how to float, glide, kick and swim on the front and back. This class is for students who cannot do skills independently. Ages 10-15.

Intermediate Teen: This class is for students who can already float, glide, kick and swim on the front and back. Students will be taught proper form and technique for swimming front and backcrawl. Rhythmic breathing, elementary backstroke, and breaststroke will be introduced. Ages 10-15.

Advanced Teen: This class is for students that can proficiently swim the front and back crawl, elementary backstroke and breaststroke. Sidestroke and butterfly will be introduced. Students will begin to learn advanced techniques such as turns, and will begin distance/endurance swimming. Ages 10-15.

ADULT PROGRAM-AGES 16 AND UP

Beginner Adult: For those that have never swam before and have a fear of the water. Class focuses on becoming comfortable in and around the water. Skills will include going underwater, floating, gliding, kicking and swimming with the assistance of a floatation device and/or instructor if necessary.

Intermediate Ádult: For those that have completed the Beginner class or are comfortable in the water. Students should be able to swim independently before enrolling. Class focuses on various strokes such as the front crawl, back crawl, breaststroke, elementary backstroke, sidestroke and butterfly. Correct form/technique will be taught. Advanced Adults: For those who are strong swimmers and want to get a swim team type workout. This class will include proper stretches, warm-ups, workouts and cool downs.





WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?

When rain falls and snow melts, the runoff produced may pickup a variety of contaminants (salt, oils, grease, fertilizer, pet waste) polluting our lakes and streams.

Remember: storm drains lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

- Americans generate 10.5 million tons of plastic each year and only recycle 1-2%.
- More than 22 million pounds of plastic pollution end up in the Great Lakes every year.
- The Great Lakes provide drinking water for over 40 million people. Microplastics can make their way through water treatment facilities and end up in our drinking water.
- Plastic debris makes up about 80% of litter on Great Lakes shorelines.
- Great Lakes plastic usually comes from local sources like storm drains and windblown litter.
- Every year, over 8 million tons of plastic enter the ocean.
- Plastic bags and other plastic garbage in the ocean kills as many as 1 million marine animals & birds in the Pacific Ocean every year.
- Ocean plastic can get caught up in currents and circulate the globe.



PLASTIC WASTE & STORMWATER

Rainwater and wind can carry plastic waste into storm drains or directly into nearby water bodies. Once in the system, local plastic waste can end up in the Great Lakes and ultimately the Atlantic Ocean. Plastic waste is extremely persistent in the environment and continually breaks down into smaller pieces called *microplastics*.

Microplastics are defined as plastic fragments less than 5mm in size (the top of a push pin) and have the potential to infiltrate our drinking water and food chains.



CURRENT PLASTIC BANS & POLICY CHANGES

Costa Rica will become the first country to ban single-use plastics and plans to eliminate them from the country by 2021. The ban will include straws, cutlery, bags, bottles, and cups made from plastic.

In July of 2018, India announced it would eliminate all single-use plastics in the country by 2020.

Hawaii has moved forward with legislation to ban all single-use plastics after banning plastic bags from grocery stores in 2015.

In June 2019, Canada announced it would ban some plastic products as early as 2021.

Keep reusable bags in your car, bag or purse, and bring them with you.

Use a wooden stirrer.

Use reusable food storage containers.

Use and wash your normal dishware.

Keep reusable cutlery with you or use compostable cutlery.

CITY RENTS STORAGE BUILDING FOR \$1 A YEAR TO VETS RETURNING HOME

The new furniture warehouse on Hoover Road north of 12 Mile features more than 3,000 square feet of space that will serve as a showroom, or many little showrooms, filled with furniture donated to the program for Vets Returning Home.

"I've got three families who have been calling all week," said Sandy Bower, founder and CEO of Vets Returning Home (VRH), a nonprofit organization that supports local veterans and operates a transitional living facility in Roseville. "One family is looking for a couch, another one needs beds, and a third family is looking for household items like towels and bedding."

However, the charity has never had enough space to keep all the items donated.

At times, knowing what it would mean to veterans, Bower and her team have juggled donations, timing it so they could pick up the furniture on the same day it needed to be delivered. They also took advantage of the firstmonth-for-free offers extended by local storage unit businesses but because of the expense had to move everything to a new site once their month was up.

"We are thrilled to announce that the struggle is over," Bower said, adding her thanks to Warren Mayor Jim Fouts and the City of Warren for allowing them to rent the building.

"It's the least we can do for the veterans, who have served us and come home in need of help," Fouts said.

For its part, Warren will receive \$1 a year for the next 10 years from Vets Returning Home.

"That might not seem like a great deal but the tax-deferred property was formerly owned by a drug dealer," said Fouts. "This move will take something negative and turn it into something positive."

Warren has donated two homes to the charity helping service members. Both are in desperate need of repairs and renovations before anyone can move in, but Bower has no doubt VRH will get the help they need.





WARREN WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT WINS PERFORMANCE AWARD

Demonstrates Excellence in Water Resource Recovery Practices

The City of Warren Waste Water Treatment Plant recently received the EGLE/MWEA Premier Utility Management Performance (PUMP) Award from the Michigan Water Environment Association.

The PUMP Award is given to municipal water resource recovery facilities that have made strides with new or enhanced water resource recovery practices that follow Effective Utility Management (EUM) principles.

Warren's Waste Water Recovery Facility was originally designed in 1957. Since that time it has undergone considerable changes and become one of the leaders in wastewater treatment in the state.

Warren now has a state of the art treatment plant that has a design capacity of 50 MGD per day and can handle a peak flow during a wet weather event of 100 MGD. The City of Warren Water Recovery Facility regularly treats 22 MGD of wastewater. The average resident creates 350 gallons of wastewater a day. The plant treats that water and the water used by our industries to produce a quality effluent to the waters of the state.

NEW RETENTION BASIN Coming Soon

The City of Warren is currently constructing a 21 MG Detention basin at 14200 Stephens. This basin is being constructed to correct the deficiencies in the sewer collection system. These deficiencies in the sewer system contribute to sanitary sewer overflows as well as the occasional basement backups.

TAX TIPS FOR SENIORS



Current research indicates that individuals are likely to make errors when preparing their tax returns. The following tax tips were developed to help you avoid some of the common errors dealing with the standard deduction for seniors, the taxable amount of Social Security benefits, and the Credit for the Elderly and Disabled.

Standard Deduction for Se-

niors: If you do not itemize your deductions, you can get a higher standard deduction amount if you and/or your spouse are 65 years old or older. You can get an even higher standard deduction amount if either you or your spouse is blind. (See Form 1040 and Form 1040A instructions.)

Taxable Amount of Social Security Benefits: When preparing your return, be especially careful when you calculate the taxable amount of your Social Security. Use the Social Security benefits worksheet found in the instructions for IRS Form 1040 and Form 1040A, and then double-check it before you fill out your tax return. See Publication 915, Social Security and Equivalent Railroad Retirement Benefits.

Credit for the Elderly or Disabled: You must file using Form 1040 or Form 1040A to receive the Credit for the Elderly or Disabled. You cannot get the Credit for the Elderly or Disabled if you file using Form 1040EZ. Be sure to apply for the Credit if you qualify; please read below for details.

Who Can Take the Credit: The Credit is based on your age, filing status and income. You may be able to take the Credit if:

Age: You and/or your spouse are either 65 years or older; or under age 65 years old and are permanently and totally disabled.

Filing Status: Your income on Form 1040 line 38 is less than \$17,500, \$20,000 (married filing jointly and only one spouse qualifies), \$25,000 (married filing jointly and both qualify), or \$12,500 (married filing separately and lived apart from your spouse for the entire year).

And, the non-taxable part of your Social Security or other nontaxable pensions, annuities or disability income is less than \$5,000 (single, head of household, or qualifying widow/er with diependent child); \$5,000 (married filing jointly and only one spouse qualifies); \$7,500 (married filing jointly and both qualify); or \$3,750 (married filing separately and lived apart from your spouse the entire year).

Calculating the Credit: Use Schedule R (Form 1040 or 1040A), Credit for the Elderly or Disabled, to figure the amount of the credit. See the instructions for Schedule R (Forms 1040 or 1040A) if you want the IRS to figure this credit for you.

Also see Publications 524 (Credit for the Elderly or Disabled); and 554 (Tax Guide for Seniors).


