

Warren Mayor Jim Fouts Announces All-Out Effort Against Illegal Fireworks; Will Visit Fireworks Stores July 1 And Ride-long With Police July 4

Warren, MI – In an attempt to control illegal fireworks in Warren on July 4, on Wednesday, July 1 at various times Mayor Jim Fouts will be visiting stores selling fireworks to advise owners about city fireworks regulations (See attached). For the third consecutive year, Fouts will ride-along with a Warren police officer July 4 at 9 p.m. to monitor city streets for fireworks violations.

Police will check their credentials to assure they are in compliance. Operators of roadside stands and tents are required to have a state license and a City of Warren Temporary and Seasonal Outdoor Retail License. For those who are not in compliance, a citation shall be issued and the tent/roadside stand shall be shut down.

Fouts also said a special task has been formed consisting of police, property maintenance inspectors, CERT (a police volunteer group), fire department personnel, and park employees, all of whom will be patrolling neighborhoods July 4. This year, for the second year, police undercover officers will also be on the lookout for fireworks ordinance violators.

Police patrols will be specifically assigned to fireworks enforcement.

Fouts said penalties are a \$500 fine or 90 days in jail, and city parks will be closed, and school properties where fireworks are prohibited will be checked regularly.

Fouts is the only public official in Michigan to voice opposition to the fireworks law passed by the State Legislature in 2012. “The new law is a money grab by state lawmakers at the expense of disrupting our neighborhoods,” says Fouts. “Now, fireworks are louder, longer and more lethal.”

“The legislation legalizes fireworks on 10 holidays including Christmas and Thanksgiving, which I believe is inappropriate. These are family holidays, hardly days to discharge loud fireworks,” says Fouts. “When fireworks are discharged, I receive many calls from upset residents about the impact of loud fireworks on their pets, senior citizens, and their peace and tranquility. I still believe this law should be rescinded because of the disruption, police overtime, blight, and noise caused by the law.”

Fouts says he supports the proposed legislation introduced by State Rep. Henry Yanez that gives local communities like Warren more control over fireworks.

Up To \$500 Fine For Violating Warren's Fireworks Regulations

- Only adults 18 and over can purchase or discharge fireworks.
- A minor under the age of 18 can discharge low impact fireworks (ground sparklers only) under the supervision of a parent or guardian (prohibited from 10:30 p.m. – 11 a.m.)
- Fireworks can only be discharged the day before, the day of and the day after a holiday
- Fireworks cannot be discharged while under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs
- Fireworks cannot be discharged on national holidays between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- Fireworks cannot be discharged on any street in Warren. Traffic cannot be impeded at any time.
- Discharge of fireworks prohibited in any public park, school property, city streets and sidewalks and easements, including the ITC corridor
- Discharge of fireworks cannot disrupt the public peace and cannot cause debris on private and public property
- Discharging fireworks prohibited within 30 ft. of any house, structure, building, vehicle or landscaping
- Discharging low impact fireworks (ground sparklers) is prohibited within 15 ft. of another person's property without the property owner's permission
